



Rotary Club of Salem Gold Star Report No. 27 July 1 2017 - June 30 2018

One of the greater attributes of the Rotary Club of Salem, is that of a self-directed, motivated, and caring group working together as friends to make a positive impact in and beyond our community. The outcome of that effort fits the Rotary International theme for 2018—2019 “Be the Inspiration”. Inspiring others through the actions of our club in turn inspires Rotarians to do more, and that was certainly the case for the Rotary Club of Salem in 2018-2019.

Actions, focused on the 2018-2019 club theme of Friendship and Impact, were truly inspiring. Our 18 Hands On projects contributed over 500 hours of volunteer work by our members. Our annual small grants program once again disbursed \$10,000. Our literacy committee disbursed \$3,800 in literacy grants. The club participated in purchasing and distributing over 4,000 dictionaries to all 4th graders in the Salem-Keizer area. We donated children’s books to those in need within our community. Our membership purchased Christmas gifts for distribution to the State Hospital and through the Tree of Lights program. We continued our long-standing blood donation program. Club members participated in the Salvation Army bell ringing, something this club has done for over 90 years. These were just a few inspiring activities, there were more.

Our club continues to be an inspiration in our support of youth, both locally and internationally. The ongoing involvement in the exchange student program sent Brenda Hernandez to Japan and brought Stefan Hosio from Finland. Three music programs were hosted with participation from Battle Creek Elementary, South Salem High School and Sprague High School. Our sponsorship of Salem North and South High Schools included Students of the Month and a May program run entirely by the schools teaming together. The club sponsors an Interact club at South Salem High that was quite active this year. We sponsored three young adults to Rotary Youth Leadership Awards [RYLA].

Larger, more complex projects were also taken on by the motivated and skilled membership of our club. The annual Multi-Sport Riverfest cosponsored with South Salem Rotary continues to grow. The club rewrote and ratified a new Constitution, Bylaws and Procedures document. A long-range Visioning Session was held, and the foundation laid for more effective club strategic planning. And the work continued on the club’s 100th anniversary legacy gift to our community: The Gerry Frank I Salem Rotary Amphitheater in Salem’s Riverfront Park. Many key milestones were achieved with this multimillion-dollar project including final site selection, ratification into Salem’s Master Park Plan, general contractor selection, design refinement, and significant fundraising results.

As mentioned, the club had a 2018-2019 theme of Friendship and Impact. The above demonstrates significant impact. Building strong friendships is just as important and the club initiated many efforts to ease the challenges that come from a club of our size, for opportunities to get to know each other. The new member orientation plan was revamped. The traditional plan of transitioning from a new member red badge to blue badge was redesigned. Offering more opportunities for interaction at informal functions was emphasized, with more Hands-On Projects, Vocational Tours, and Social Drop Ins.

Befitting the definition of Rotary by Joseph Kovarik of Cottage Grove, MN, the Rotary Club of Salem is a club that Improves People’s Lives Locally and Globally Through Service to which we added Building Friendships Along the Way.

The Rotary Club of Salem - Who We Are

The Rotary Club of Salem first organized in September 1919 when a small group of forward-looking business and professional men met above Giles' Wholesale Fruit Store at south High and Trade Streets. The club was officially chartered on January 1, 1920. The Rotary Club of Salem was the 306th club formed in the world and has been making contributions ever since.

The Rotary Club of Salem is the second largest club in District 5100. Our attendance averaged 57%. Attendance includes attending weekly meetings, participating in Rotary sponsored activities and events, meeting make-ups at other club meetings - anywhere in the world, on-line make-ups, committee meetings and other committee work. Our membership reached 189. We ended the year with 175. Of those, we have two Honorary members, 13 Corporate Principals, 20 Rule of 85 and 174 active members. Our membership is made up of 55% males; 45% females. 34 were in their first year as members. Average age is 58.

International Youth Exchange, Interact, Student of the Month, RYLA, Literacy, Dictionary Committees

International Youth Exchange - Linda Bednarz. This year our Youth Exchange program hosted Stefan Hosio from Finland who attended South Salem High. Our outbound student, Brenda Hernandez Aquilar from McNary

HS to Japan. The committee has added new members and has continued to network with other local clubs in recruiting students for short term and long term exchanges to provide foundations of world understanding.

Student of the Month - Ryan Collier. We had eighteen incredible students of the month and three Rotary Youth Leadership Award recipients. Outstanding students from North Salem High School and South Salem High School were recognized each month. Each month, students told us of their lives, school activities, and their future plans and dreams. Categories from which students were chosen include student body president, fall athletes, humanities, math/science, service above self, winter athlete, vocational, and performing arts.

RYLA - Ida Mae Lafky. Recognizes young leaders and provides them with an opportunity to expand their perceptions and ideals. RYLA participants gain knowledge about themselves and learn to work with others in order to become better people and future leaders. We sent three to the training this year.

Literacy - Jenn Columbus. This year the Literacy Committee provided:

Family Building Blocks: \$1,750

St Francis Shelter: \$750

Salem Public Library Foundation: \$1,000

Bookmobile: \$300

We used matching funds from Districts to leverage some of these into additional money.

Dictionary Project - Julie Hilty. We began distributing dictionaries 21 years ago to every student in 4th grade in Salem Keizer Schools in either English or Spanish. The Dictionary Project has grown to include all Rotary Clubs in Salem. We distributed more than 3,800 dictionaries in 68 elementary schools in Salem. Funds for this program are raised through members buying ½ or full cases of dictionaries and a district grant

Goal of \$4,901 achieved through donations and a district grant.

South Salem High School Interact Club - This year, our own club's International Service Committee began working to align the Interact Club's international service project with our own projects such as Haiti's Water Wells.

International Service - Howard Bauman. Our fourth global grant in Haiti was approved in May This \$80,000 project for 6 wells and 2 community latrines took more than 2 years to get approved, but drilling should start soon. Delays are common in international work, in this case: 2 major hurricanes, the breakup of our host club, the formation of a new one, an unexpected last-minute change in hydrology standards which required additional consultation, and possibly the worst political unrest we have yet seen in Haiti.

When this project is completed, we will have completed a total of 17 wells, 4 community latrines, investing \$210,000 in Haiti's health infrastructure over the last decade. We have seen improved economies, school attendance, and the halt of cholera deaths in these villages.

Our Rotary Club has also continued to encourage other clubs internationally by contributing to their projects. This year we have supported:
