The Rotary Club of Salem began in September 1919 when a small group of forward-looking business and professional men met above Giles' Wholesale Fruit Store at south High and Trade Streets. The Rotary Club of Salem was the 306<sup>th</sup> club formed in the world and has been making contributions ever since.

The Rotary Club of Salem is the second largest club in District 5100 and ranks 25th in attendance with an average of 78% of members attending meetings. Attendance includes attending weekly meetings, participating in Rotary sponsored activities and events, meeting make-ups by attending other club meetings, on-line make-ups and committee meetings. We ended the year with four honorary members, 18 corporate memberships, and 25 Rule of 85 members.

# **Community Service 2: Fundraising**

We provided funds to Center for Hope and Safety. \$28,500 went to their capital campaign and was matched by Salem Foundation. The Volunteer Center provides workstations for volunteers answering the crisis line, working on data input, and other many projects needed to help the program. The Salem Rotary Volunteer Center allowed the Center for Hope and Safety to more than triple the number of volunteers available for supporting victims and working on projects. The office has more than 2,000 hours logged by more than 150 volunteers. New volunteers coming in every week. Students from the School for the Deaf come in weekly and wash toys, windows, etc. Thirty Wells Fargo employees came into sort donations and get 9-1-1 cell phones ready to give survivors.

## **Community Service 3: New Generations**

- International Youth Exchange Linda Bednarz. Our international Youth Exchange program continues to flourish, helping to increase world understanding and build the foundations of future peace. This year we hosted Yusuke Nagaoka from Japan. Our club sponsored Alicia Munoz who went to India.
- Student of the Month Ryan Collier. We had eighteen incredible students of the month and three Rotary Youth Leadership Award recipients. Outstanding students from North Salem High School and South Salem High School were recognized each month. Each month, students told us of their lives, school activities, and their future plans and dreams. Categories from which students were chosen include student body president, fall athletes, humanities, math/science, service above self, winter athlete, vocational, and performing arts.
- **RYLA** recognizes young leaders and provide them with an opportunity to expand their perceptions and ideals. RYLA participants gain knowledge about themselves and learn to work with others in order to become a better person and a future leader.
- Literacy Program Jayne Downing. The Youth Literacy Coalition was busy this year.
  - Two international projects putting together books in the native language of Ixil for a community in Guatemala and sending books to Ubuntu Africa to start a library for children who are HIV positive (overseen by one member of the Youth Literacy Coalition members who traveled with the books and built shelves for the library).
  - Six local projects last year. The two international projects included putting together books in the native language of Ixil for a community in Guatemala. The second project involved sending books to Ubuntu Africa to start a library for children who are HIV positive.
  - Provided books for our club President to have guest speakers sign each week. Books distributed to homeless shelters or elementary schools.
  - Books for the Tree of Joy given to children and to American Red Cross to be given to children whose homes had burned or other type of disaster.
  - More than 500 books distributed to homeless shelters in Salem and Keizer. Boys and Girls club received books to encourage children they serve to read.
- Dictionary Project Todd Irvine & Kelly Pontsler. We began distributing dictionaries 18 years ago to every 4<sup>th</sup> grader in Salem Keizer Schools in either English and Spanish. We distribute dictionaries in 12 elementary schools in Salem. Funds for this program are raised through the Annual Rotary Golf Tournament.

# International Service: International Service

RI Foundation, World Community Service Project, Rotary Friendship Exchange, Ambassadorial Scholars, Books for the World

On the International Service front, we exceeded our club goal for the Rotary Foundation. We received the International Changemaker Award and became a charter Peacebuilder Club.

- Rotary Foundation/Paul Harris Foundation Gifts David Lewis. 50% of funds contributed are returned to District 5100 for use in funding our international, scholarship and other educational and humanitarian programs. \$18,437 donated this year.
- World Community Service Howard Bauman, Both International Service and the Rotary Club of Salem have had a very good 2013-2014.
- (1) The <u>India School Water Filter Project</u>, initiated by our club in 2012 and completed in May 2014, brought fresh water filters to over 100 classrooms in Bangalore, in partnership with the Rotary

Club of Bangalore. Student absenteeism had been a big problem related to impure water sources causing recurrent gastrointestinal infections. This was a \$23,000 project with our club contributing \$1,500, and \$2,500 more coming from the Rotary Clubs of Columbia County and Seaside.

- (2) <u>Haiti Water Wells, Latrines, and Hygiene Global Grant</u> was initiated by our club this year, and submitted in June 2014, in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Hinche, Haiti. This is a \$41,000 project, with our club contributing \$4,560. Another \$7,000 came from the partnering Rotary Clubs of Portland, Milwaukie, Keizer, and South Salem. The nice thing here is the generous matching funds that comes to our project from our District and from TRF. This project is to continue a similar project that our club completed last year in this deforested and very poor area of Haiti. In addition, this project will be initiating latrines in one of the villages.
- (3) Our <u>Indonesia Well-Drilling Project</u> with the Rotary Club of Bali has been a project in progress since 2009-2010, unfortunately ending back in 2011 with a dry tap. However, with encouragement from the host club, and Gail Gable's recent visit to this area of Indonesia, our club committed \$8,300 more last Rotary year for the completion of this project. He hopes for a drilling reattempt by September 2014.
- (4) We have also partnered with other District Clubs to help by contributing to their Global Grants:
  - (a) A large Honduras Sanitation Project with Seaside Rotary, total cost = \$190,000, is very similar to our own Haiti project \$3,000 was donated.

(b) India Tibetan Ambulances with Portland Rotary - \$1,000 donated. We have partnered with Portland Rotary in the past with this very successful project to improve medical care in Tibetan refugee camps in the northern portion of India.

- (5) Donation to the Valparaiso Fire Disaster \$767, through the efforts of both the White Salmon Rotary Club and a past District 5100 youth exchange student from Chile.
- **Peace Builder** This was the third year for our PeaceBuilder committee and through it, our club helped to sponsor students from Cypress for a second time. The youth represented both sides of the divided country and came to the USA to learn about each other as well as how to help bridge the conflicts that divide them.

#### Salem Rotary Foundation 2013-2014 Gold Star Report Larry Gray

The Salem Rotary Foundation is an IRS-recognized not-for-profit organization, "the charitable heart of Salem Rotary." Its members are members of the Rotary Club of Salem. Foundation funds support the Good Works Committee's small grants and the Foundation's non-profit status helps support the Club's Major Good Works project.

Highlights of the 2013-2014 year were: the Fall Social, a "Spaghetti Western" fund-raiser at the Willamette Heritage Center; establishment of a new Donor Recognition program, including presentations in June to fourteen Rotarians in the Legacy Circle -- those who have named the Foundation in their estate plan; and the Club's vote to amend the Foundation's Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation. A change was to clarify that the Foundation may fund projects in the greater Salem area and projects that primarily benefit young people.

The Foundation board thanks members of the Rotary Club of Salem for your generous support of your Salem Rotary Foundation. Whether it be a \$20 bellringer, a small donation, help with the Fall Social, budgeted Club expenditures for speaker recognition and club match, participation in our weekly raffle, or a major gift, every member helps your Foundation grow.
