The Rotary International theme this year was "Light Up Rotary," a phase coming from the thought that is it better to light one candle than to sit and curse the darkness. Our club shone a light in our community again this year, brightening the way for many, and shining a light on Rotary in the process.

We continued our long tradition of blood drives, support for our annual city-wide Food Drive, and our holiday giving to the Tree of Joy. Our Salvation Army Kettle drives were as strong as ever.

We sent another two participants to Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), allowing them to gain confidence in their leadership skills and become the leaders of tomorrow. We recognized truly outstanding students from North Salem and South Salem High Schools, and distributed more than 4,000 dictionaries to area 4th graders. Our Literacy Committee went well beyond dictionaries to distribute thousands of children's books by various means. In youth exchange, we sent Ally Peterson to Mexico, hosted Andres Klingler from Argentina, and shared the hosting of Claire Devousin from France with the Creekside club.

Our weekly e-newsletter kept members and friends up to date, and a major project over the course of the year was updating our website, <a href="www.RotaryClubOfSalem.com">www.RotaryClubOfSalem.com</a> to bring updated branding and a sleeker look and interface. We've begun to explore a collaboration with CCTV to televise some of our fabulous programs, which continue to be a weekly highlight of membership.

The fundraiser raised just short of \$59,000, \$23,000 of which was dedicated to our major Good Works project, HOME Youth and Resource Center's Youth Empowerment Program (YEP). This program is for homeless and disadvantaged teens who make a commitment to continue their education and make positive contributions to the community. By supporting youth in this program, we sent a powerful message that there are people who care about them and their future.

In additional to our major Good Works project, we also provided \$10,000 in small grants to area non-profits. The remainder of the funds were distributed among our club's committees for our broader charitable causes.

Having had a good year financially, we began to think about the year 2020, when our club will be celebrating its 100th year. In hopes that we will undertake a larger than normal community project in recognition of our centennial, we earmarked \$15,000 as seed funding for such a project.

As a club, we get things done. We are forever changing lives.



#### The Rotary Club of Salem - Who We Are

The Rotary Club of Salem first organized in September 1919 when a small group of forward-looking business and professional men met above Giles' Wholesale Fruit Store at south High and Trade Streets. The club was officially chartered on January 1, 1920. The Rotary Club of Salem was the 306th club formed in the world and has been making contributions ever since.

The Rotary Club of Salem is the second largest club in District 5100. Our attendance averaged 69.43%. Attendance includes attending weekly meetings, participating in Rotary sponsored activities and events, meeting make-ups at other club meetings - anywhere in the world, on-line make-ups, committee meetings and other

committee work. Our membership reached 184. We ended the year with 173. Of those, we have two honorary members, 18 Corporate Principals, 28 Rule of 85 and 137 active members.

Due to Rotary shining a light on at-risk and homeless youth and Rotary's investment in HOME Youth & Resource Center our surrounding community has taken notice and stepped up to support as well. More than \$12,000 of inkind support including skilled labor remodeling two bathrooms, including bathroom fixtures (sinks, shower, and flooring), flooring throughout the upstairs, architecture designs and support, and a new seating area outside. Another donation purchased a new washer and dryer and locking lockers for teen's personal belongings. On November 5th, HOME was notified that Meyer Memorial Trust that they will receive a \$99,000 grant to re-side the building and expand services to weekends.

Financially Rotary contributed \$23,000 and HOME was able to leverage an additional \$111,000.

#### Community Service 3: New Generations Bo Nyleen

International Youth Exchange, Interact, Student of the Month, RYLA, Literacy, Dictionary Committees

**International Youth Exchange - Linda Bednarz.** Our international Youth Exchange program continues to flourish, helping to increase world understanding and build the foundations of future peace. This year we hosted Andres Klingler from Argentina, and shared the hosting of Claire Devousin from France with the Creekside club. Our club sponsored Ally Peterson who went to Mexico.

**Student of the Month - Ryan Collier.** We had eighteen incredible students of the month and three Rotary Youth Leadership Award recipients. Outstanding students from North Salem High School and South Salem High School were recognized each month. Each month, students told us of their lives, school activities, and their future plans and dreams. Categories from which students were chosen include student body president, fall athletes, humanities, math/science, service above self, winter athlete, vocational, and performing arts.

**RYLA - Ida Mae Lafky.** Recognizes young leaders and provides them with an opportunity to expand their perceptions and ideals. RYLA participants gain knowledge about themselves and learn to work with others in order to become better people and future leaders. We sent two to the training this year.

**Literacy - Jayne Downing.** The Literacy Committee supported the Ixil indigenous language project, by providing funding to create more books and by assembling books for distribution in Guatemala. Books were also provided for the Summer Bookmobile, the Boys and Girls Club, and the books the President has on hand for speakers to sign each week. In addition to the funding we received from the Club, we received a District grant this year. We were able to purchase twice as many books for the Marion-Polk Food Share. These books are distributed with food boxes in our community.

**Dictionary Project - Todd Irvine.** We began distributing dictionaries 18 years ago to every student in 4th grade in Salem Keizer Schools in either English or Spanish. We distributed more than 3,800 dictionaries in 68 elementary schools in Salem. Funds for this program are raised through the Annual Rotary Golf Tournament. Total cost of dictionaries was \$3,984.

**International Service - Howard Bauman.** The Rotary Club of Salem can be very proud of living up to our commitment to engage in international service. As a member of the District International Service Committee, our International Service is among the leaders in District 5100.

Haiti Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (Global Grant I).

This project, coupled with our recent Matching Grant, allowed our club to complete six wells and one community latrine in Hinche, Haiti.

Haiti Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (Global Grant II).

We are seeking an \$80,000 grant for more wells, latrines, and maybe an irrigation system. Bo Nyleen, Cynthia Witham, and Howard Baumann will continue actively with this project.

Indonesia Well-Drilling Project dating back to 2009-2010.

This has been a project of love and determination, which unfortunately got side tracked with a dry tap in 2011. This was followed by a briefly successful tap in 2014, but the drill-bit broke off, blocking the shaft. John Shirley and his counterpart in Bali have continued to push for completion. More to follow.

We have also partnered with several District and International Clubs on their projects:

Seaside Rotary's Honduras Sanitation Project.

This is a very large project that got sidetracked due to logistics in Honduras, but will likely go forward next Rotary year. We contributed \$3,000 out of last year's budget.

RC of Newberg Early Birds' La Plata Parks Project.

We contributed \$1,000 for this remarkable project in Columbia that improves central city parks and secondarily the integrity of the surrounding neighborhoods.

Beaverton's Uganda Agriculture Project.

We contributed \$500 to help with this project to improve the status of female farmers in Uganda.

RC of Salem-Midtown, India's Artificial Limbs project in the Philippines.

We contributed \$3,000. There has been talk of an eventual sister-city relationship.

Portland Rotary asked us to help with two projects in Guatemala: Smoke Free Stoves and Middle School Scholarships.

We contributed \$1,000 and \$900 respectively. The stove project is life saving, and the scholarships have had a profound effect on education attainment.

Portland Pearl's Nepal Literacy.

We committed \$1,000 for this multifaceted project. Then sadly came the tragic earthquake of April 25<sup>th</sup>. Currently the project is being reevaluated, and will probably pick up momentum again sometime in the next 1-2 years

Rotaract. The Rotaract Club sponsored by our club has completed its sixth year.

#### Salem Rotary Foundation Annual Report 2014-2015 Mary Beth Beall - President

The Salem Rotary Foundation is an IRS-recognized not-for-profit organization, "the charitable heart of Salem Rotary." Its members are members of the Rotary Club of Salem. Foundation funds support the Good Works Committee's Small Grants and also help to support the Club's annual Major Good Works project.

Highlights of the 2014-2015 year were the Fall Social, an evening of music and fellowship held at the Center for Hope and Safety; last year's major Good Works Project recipient. In September, Salem Rotary Foundation month, the newly established Donor Recognition program recognized Rotarians who joined the Legacy Circle -- those who have named the Foundation in their estate---as well as those earning Sustaining, Bronze, Silver, Gold and Benefactor Circles.

After a one year hiatus, Good Works Committee Small Grants were awarded in June to seven deserving non-profit organizations in the Salem Area.

The Foundation Board thanks the members of the Rotary Club of Salem for your generous support of your Salem Rotary Foundation. Whether a \$20 Bellringer, a small donation, help with the Fall Social, budgeted Club expenditures for speaker recognition and club match, participation in our weekly raffle, or a major gift, every member helps your Foundation grow.
