The Rotary Club of Salem first organized in September 1919 when a small group of forward-looking business and professional men met above Giles' Wholesale Fruit Store at south High and Trade Streets. The club was officially chartered on January 1, 1920. The Rotary Club of Salem was the 306th club formed in the world and has been making contributions ever since.

The Rotary Club of Salem is the second largest club in District 5100. Our attendance averaged 52%. Attendance includes attending weekly meetings, participating in Rotary sponsored activities and events, meeting make-ups at other club meetings - anywhere in the world, on-line make-ups, committee meetings and other committee work. We have two honorary members, 13 Corporate Principals, 20 Rule of 85 and 152 active members. Our membership is made up of 54% males; 46% females. 18 were in their first year as members.

Centennial Stage Project - Barry Nelson & Ken Van Osdol. In celebration of our centennial anniversary, the Rotary Club of Salem committed to raise funds for the design and construction of a new multi-purpose amphitheater stage at Salem's Riverfront Park. The design, selected from CB Two Architects, began in earnest. The Amphitheater Project started the year with \$836,663 in the bank and ended the year with \$2,613,554, a net increase of \$1,776,8941. Total income for the Amphitheater Project, which we expect to complete in the 2021-2022 Rotary year, is \$3,001,436. Expenses \$387,881, leaving the aforementioned \$2,613,554 in the bank.

At this writing total commitments toward the project are \$3,681,998 vs. our \$4,000,000 goal.

International Youth Exchange - Christine Whiteside. This year our Youth Exchange program hosted Hiyori Tanaka who attended South Salem High. Our outbound student, Christian Aguero from McNary HS went to Japan. The committee has added new members and has continued to network with other local clubs in recruiting students for short term and long term exchanges to provide foundations of world understanding.

Student of the Month - Elise Bauman. We had eighteen incredible students of the month and three [Youth Leadership Award recipients. Outstanding students from North Salem High School and South Salem High School were recognized each month. Each month, students told us of their lives, school activities, and their future plans and dreams. Categories from which students were chosen include student body president, fall athletes, humanities, math/science, service above self, winter athlete, vocational, and performing arts.

RYLA - Ida Mae Lafky. Recognizes young leaders and provides them with an opportunity to expand their perceptions and ideals. RYLA participants gain knowledge about themselves and learn to work with others in order to become better people and future leaders.

International Service - Howard Bauman. The Rotary Club of Salem has had a very active international year! Our 4th Haiti Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene project was completed in October. This \$80,000 project for 6 wells

and 2 community latrines took nearly three years to complete, not unusual for projects in the Caribbean, considering all the hurricanes, political unrest, and the novel coronavirus. This brings our total count to 17 wells, 4 community latrines, investing nearly \$225,000 into Haiti's health infrastructure. These efforts have significantly improved the economies, school attendance, waterborne illnesses, including cholera, in these villages in East-Central Haiti. Our success has been very satisfying, and it's also nice that 11 district clubs partnered with us by donating to our Haiti and Water Project. Thus, we will soon be initiating our 5th Haiti Global Grant.
