The Club was officially chartered on January 1, 1920. The Rotary Club of Salem was the 306th club formed in the world and has been making contributions ever since.

The Rotary Club of Salem is the second largest club in District 5100. Our attendance averaged 52%. Attendance includes attending weekly meetings, participating in Rotary sponsored activities and events, meeting make-ups at other club meetings - anywhere in the world, on-line make-ups, committee meetings and other committee work. We have one honorary member (Gerry Frank), 13 Corporate Principals, 20 Rule of 85 and 152 active members. Our membership is made up of 54% males; 46% females. 18 were in their first year as members.

**Good Works Event - Beth Rhoades.** With the help of Jenn Columbus and Brenda Kidder, Beth drafted a letter to the membership explaining the board's decision not to hold our annual good works fundraiser event. Instead, members were asked to contribute to support the on going needs of standing committees, other club expenses and the final push for the amphitheater. Members responded. *\$50,691raised - no event held all from from a member ask* 

**Centennial Stage Project - Barry Nelson & Ken Van Osdol**. This year marked major milestones for our Centennial Project legacy gift to the community. First, fundraising wrapped up achieving our \$4,000,000 goal with \$1.1 million coming from us, the Rotary Club of Salem. Then the project literally hit the ground with the beginning of construction. The first concrete footings were poured in December. Our northwest yellow cedar was cut in Canada, fabricated into the beams in Portland, and installation began in February. The cover was produced in New England, fabricated in Poland, and installed in March. The remainder of our Rotary year was dedicated to the finishing touches for completing our gift to the community. *Total commitments toward the project are \$3,681,998 vs. our \$4,000,000 goal.*

# **International Service Committees**

**International Service - Howard Bauman.** Our committee's motto is Preserve the "I" in RI. This has been a surprisingly busy year for our International Service Committee, despite Covid-19, hurricanes, and political unrest in Haiti. We have been involved with Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Projects in Haiti since 2010. Our most recent project in Haiti was completed and the Final Report submitted on 6/18/21. This total \$80,000 project created 6 wells and 2 community latrines, bringing our total to 17 wells, and 4 community latrines, all functioning, investing more than \$250,000 overall into Haiti's health infrastructure. These efforts have significant- ly improved the economies, waterborne illnesses, including cholera, and school attendance, in these villages in East-Central Haiti. One of these wells for the first time brought consistently clean water to their regional hospital for surgery and for patient use. We appreciated that 11 other District 5100 clubs partnered with us by donating to this project. Work has begun on the application for our 5th global grant.

Our Rotary Club has a long history of encouraging other district clubs internationally by contributing to their projects. This year we have supported:

# Salem Rotary FoundationAnnual Report

The 2020-2021 Rotary year was outstanding for our foundation, the charitable heart of the Rotary Club of Salem. Member contributions totaled \$37,245, bellringers \$13,254, club support \$10,000, interest \$74, and investment account growth \$264,004 (25%). It was an extraordinary year in the equity markets. Grants totaled \$12,000 against a grants budget of \$50,000. In light of the penultimate year of the Gerry Frank/Salem Rotary Amphitheater project, and the pandemic, our club elected not to fund a major good works project this Rotary year.

Our foundation also served as the charitable entity that built the Gerry Frank/Salem Rotary Amphitheater dis- cussed elsewhere in this report.

Expenses totaled \$2,058, and the Foundation also reviewed and revised our investment policy during the year. Financial statements and foundation records are available to any member of the club who requests them. The Foundation board usually meets the third Wednesday of the month from 3:30-5:00 p.m. Members are welcome to attend board meetings.

The Salem Rotary Foundation board of directors includes 7 Salem Rotary Club members who are selected to serve 3-year terms.
