The Hands On Committee continues to put forth opportunities for our members to work with nonprofits on their needs and our Membership Committee is devising strategies that will help attract and retain new members. # The Rotary Club of Salem - Who We Are

The Rotary Club of Salem first organized in September 1919 when a small group of forward-looking business and professional men met above Giles' Wholesale Fruit Store at south High and Trade Streets. The Club was officially chartered on January 1, 1920. The Rotary Club of Salem was the 306th club formed in the world and has been making contributions ever since.

The Rotary Club of Salem is the second largest club in District 5100. Our attendance averaged 52%. Attendance includes attending weekly meetings, participating in Rotary sponsored activities and events, meeting make-ups at other club meetings - anywhere in the world, on-line make-ups, committee meetings and other committee work. We ended the year with one honorary member (Ellen Wyant), 12 corporate principals, 18 rule of 85 and 152 active members. Our membership is made up of 85 (57%) males; 65 (43%) females.

International Youth Exchange, Interact, Student of the Month, RYLA, Literacy

**International Youth Exchange - Christine Whiteside.** COVID interrupted everything world wide. We were able to recruit students who left in August 2022 but hosted no inbound students.

**Student of the Month - Elise Bauman.** We had eighteen incredible students of the month and three Youth Leadership Award recipients. Outstanding students from North Salem High School and South Salem High School were recognized each month. Each month, students told us of their lives, school activities, and their future plans and dreams. Categories from which students were chosen include student body president, fall athletes, humanities, math/science, service above self, winter athlete, vocational, and performing arts.

**RYLA - Ida Lafky.** Due to Covid, RYLA was cancelled. When held, it recognizes young leaders and provides them with an opportunity to expand their perceptions and ideals. RYLA participants gain knowledge about themselves and learn to work with others in order to become better people and future leaders.

# World Community Service - Howard Baumann

As the World Community Service Committee continues its work to "Keep the I in **RI**", we have continued our efforts for a 4th Water and Sanitation Global Grant in Haiti. Despite a July 2021 presidential assassination, a devastating August 7.2 earthquake, gang rule, the December missionary kidnapping for ransom, and raging Covid-19, the Host Hinche Nord Rotary Club has remained positive and encouraging. The grant of \$117,000 will provide 6 more wells, which will bring our total to 23 wells plus 4 community latrines in Haiti since 2010. These efforts have significantly improved the economies, waterborne illnesses, and school attendance in these villages in East-Central Haiti.

Our Rotary Club also has a long history of encouraging other District clubs by contributing to their international projects. This year our Rotary Club financially supported:

- Newberg-Noon's Nepal Emergency Covid-19 Project for Oxygen Concentrators.
- Ghana School Desks, thanks to the lead efforts of committee member Marilyn Schuster.
- Guatemala Literacy Project, thanks to work by our Board Director Pat Force.
- Lake Oswego's Guatemala Literacy Project.
- Malawi Water and Sanitation Project, through the E-Club of New Zealand.

Although not out of our committee's budget, we were happy to help where possible to facilitate and monitor Salem Rotary's financial responses to the following international disasters, much appreciated:

#### Salem Rotary Foundation Annual Report 2021-2022 Jayne Downing - President

The 2021-2022 year was a good one for our Salem Rotary Foundation. With the completion of the Gerry Frank Salem Rotary Amphitheater project we had a total grants budget of \$76,500. Grants given were as follows:

Gilbert House: \$42,500 (plus \$17,500 in Club Good Works funds) East Salem Community Center: \$12,000 Chemeketa Community College Foundation – Duval Scholarship: \$2,000 Boys and Girls Club: \$2,000 Family Building Blocks: \$4,000 Horses for Hope Oregon: \$4,000 Capital Futbol Club: \$2,000 Center for Hope and Safety: \$4,000 Mid-Willamette Valley Community Action Agency: \$4,000

Our investment values declined \$201,083 net of fees. This is our first decline in investment account value in twelve years, and was not unexpected. So we started the year at \$1,415,891 and ended the year at \$1,231,520. Expenses, other than investment management fees, were \$1,454.

In addition our foundation held \$266,633 invested for future improvements to the Gerry Frank | Salem Rotary Amphitheater.

Our Foundation was led by President, Jayne Downing; Secretary/Treasurer, Tim Nissen; Board Members Larry Konick, Barry Nelson, Linda Norris, Rus McCracken, Doug Parham. We are an open-book organization so any member of the club is welcome to any additional information. We welcome your ongoing generous support.
